



# **2025 SHEPHERDING TEAMS**

# First Reformed Church, Sheldon

The congregation is divided into nine groups - one for each Elder/Deacon pair. Your consistory shepherding team is responsible for keeping in regular contact with the families listed under their names. 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
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# At FIU, College Begins in the Summer and Cru Shows Up

If you follow college sports, you've heard of the Florida International University Panthers. Home to 17 NCAA teams, this Miami-based campus has a student enrollment of 56,000, representing 142 countries. In a break with tradition, FIU allows freshmen to start college in the summer, right after high school graduation.

Who better to welcome this vast array of 18 year-olds than a Cru summer mission—right?!

This is why NYC-based staff members Thomas and Erin Rodrigues headed south earlier this summer. They and a few other staff members, joined by 22 Cru students from all over the U.S., coordinated opportunities to engage with these freshmen.

"Together we had 700 spiritual conversations, shared the gospel 379 times and saw 32 students place their faith in Christ," Thomas reports, "breaking every one of our goals."

Especially exciting was the growth in the Cru students. These young adults learned not only ministry skills (exposure to new evangelism tools, asking good questions, Bible knowledge, basic understanding of world religions ...) but also life skills: living in community, sexual wholeness, working through conflict, managing time... including lots of fun throughout.

This fall, local Miami Cru staff will pick up shepherding the new believers at FIU. As for the Cru student disciples, they're returning to their respective campuses better equipped to win, build and send their fellow students; and their FIU summer has helped instill in them a vision for the cause of Christ, promoting His love in their communities, jobs, and churches—at home and abroad—for years to come.

# PRISON LIGHTHOUSE MINISTRY NEWSLETTER August, 2025



"There is one body and one Spirit...One Lord, one faith, one baptism; One God and Father of all." Ephesians 4:4-5

The devil likes to divide Christians because he knows there is no power in division! That is why there are gangs against gangs, and ethnic groups against other ethnic groups. Matthew 12:25 says, "Every kingdom divided against itself is brought to desolation, and every city or house divided against itself will not stand." When Christians unite the evil one knows he will be defeated!

I have a Bible study every Monday with Mental Health men. I have known three of these men for over 10 years. Usually, they have had disagreements among themselves so one will not come to Bible study if the other one is coming. Some of the problems are racial. Therefore, we have talked about the love of Christ that we should have for all races and for all people. At our last Bible study all three were present and I was amazed how they were calling each other brothers in Christ! God's love is certainly at work in these men!

When I was on the Hill a few weeks ago, a young man was looking at some Christian books in the Chapel library. I asked him what kind of books he was looking for and he told me, "Any book that will help me grow as a new Christian." So we talked about how he came to know the Lord. He said, "About a year ago I was feeling hopeless. I had done many sinful things in my life. One night when it was dark in my cell I took some extra

pills to kill myself. I lay down in my bed, and then I knew I didn't want to die. I felt a heavy weight on my chest so I couldn't move. My cellie sleeps in the bed above me and his iPad that was hanging on the wall lit up for no reason. He had a cross that was hanging off the side of his bed. When his iPad lit up, it lit up the cross! I cried out to Jesus to save me and forgive me. The pressure on my chest was gone. I have been a new person ever since. I can't get enough of knowing more about Jesus and growing in His love!" God is always on time!

In early July six men were baptized! We heard some great testimonies of how the Lord had and is working in their lives. One of the men told me that when he was in lockdown, he asked himself "What have I accomplished in my 36 years of life?" He came up with, "Nothing, and I need to change! I want my life to count for eternity." I know he is bringing others with him to church and Bible study. Now he is opening with Scripture and prayer at Bible studies and the church services.

I have enjoyed meeting with a young man, who two years ago overdosed and was not expected to live. It is great to see how he is growing spiritually! He asked me if I could attend his graduation ceremony. He completed a six-month leadership class. I felt honored to be invited to witness 12 men graduate with Mayor Ten Haken as one of the speakers.

Hopefully, it is not new news that the United Reformed Church in Cincinnati, formerly known as Westside Reformed Church (WRC), has a new location in an old Baptist church building that was given to them. Because of their new location, they renamed themselves Ascension Reformed Church (ARC).

RMS has been actively looking for volunteers to help with the remodel and restoration of this great old church, built in the late 1800's. Four of us, from Michigan, Missouri, and New York, volunteered the week of Jan 20-25. It was a really great week, albeit very cold. We demo-ed and installed new floor joists and subfloor where the organ pit was, demo-ed a wall where the old organ swell shutters were located, and filled that opening in with framing and drywall. There was a door to the side of that opening that needed to be moved and reframed. We also demo-ed old offices under the main stairwell to the fellowship hall and started prep work for plastering the sanctuary walls.

We met some really great people from the congregation as well as those who have been hired to lead the RMS volunteers, (Shout out to John Paul and Elliot!). The congregation supplied a wonderful house to live in for the week, lunch every day, and supper at the house each evening, often staying to eat with us, providing wonderful fellowship.

We were very blessed by this experience and pray for the continuing work toward the completion of this sizable project. We also pray that God would use this congregation and their new facility for His glory and honor in downtown Cincinnati.

Working at ARC was one of the most fulfilling experiences of my life so far. Now, as a 16 year old, saying that isn't so grand, but it's true. During my time working there, I grew closer to God through my prayer life and through witnessing what His bride is. There was

so much time that I had on my hands just to talk to God and pray about what was on my mind, and I think I understand the power of prayer a bit better. I understand the importance of talking with God and walking with Him constantly through all things, even the dirty, nasty, gross parts of life, not just what I want Him to see. Working at ARC helped me realize what it is to serve and to be part of Christ's body eternally. It's easy to picture yourself in Heaven with the people around you on earth, but it's because of serving at ARC that I now know what it is to be part of an eternal body. In working on the Sanctuary, I had the privilege of looking through some of the old documentation of the church. And when I was looking through some of the papers, I found documents that dated back to the early twentieth century. # **Dominican Republic**

### DR. NEAL HEGEMAN

DR. HEGEMAN, A FORMER MISSIONARY IN THE DOMINICAN REPUBLIC FOR 12 YEARS, IS THE ACADEMIC DEAN OF MIAMI INTERNATIONAL SEMINARY. HE IS ALSO THE AUTHOR OF MANY BOOKS.

On January 7, 2025, Neal Hegeman and three volunteers from Reformed Mission Services (RMS) flew into Santo Domingo, the Dominican Republic. The volunteers were Steve Poll and a combination of father/daughter: Rick and Nyanne Boerman. They helped immigrants and nationals build a Haitian Dominican immigrant church in La Grua, about 15 minutes from Sabana Grande de Boya. Another mission group, from the Drenthe Christian Reformed Church, came with another agency and also stayed at the Ministry Center. They helped build more classrooms for the Juan Calvino school located on the Center's grounds.

It is a blessing to hear the devotions, prayers, and see the Christian teacher's

dedication at the Juan Calvino elementary, middle, and high school. This is one of the eleven Reformed schools that have become public schools supported by the government, but which are operated by a well-organized group of Christian leaders and teachers.



The regional monthly meetings of the leaders of the 17 churches was held at Juan Sanchez. I was impressed that this monthly meeting was orderly; as well as gospel centered, something that has not always been the case and one reason for my annual visits.

When we first started working with the Haitian immigrants in 1981, there was rapid church growth. We responded by building many churches with wood slats sides and tin roofs. In the mid

1990's, a hurricane came through and knocked down about 120 church buildings throughout the denomination (Iglesia Cristiana Reformada en la Republica Dominica). Work crews and nationals worked hard and about 90 were reconstructed with cement blocks. Very few put on a cement roof. Well, thanks to the termites (Hosea had locust, the DR has termites), it is time to put on cement roofs and complete the project. We are praying and planning to put on 20 cement roofs (only two churches in the zone have cement roofs).

Reformed Mission Services has committed to putting on new roofs starting January 2026. We need many work teams and some good-sized donations to keep ahead of the termites! Contact Rob at rob@rms.org if you are interested in helping!

As of December 31, 2024, the state of Reformed Mission Services is strong. The ministry faces the challenges of 2025 on firm spiritual, structural and financial foundations. Calendar year 2024 saw advancement and growth in all spheres of operations.

In addition to our faithful and immensely capable employees, Administrative Director Rob Brinks, Promotions Coordinator Jim Iwema, and Administrative Assistant Lori Hovingh, we added Steve Poll as Assistant Administrative Director. Steve has stepped smartly into his new role which is to act as assistant to Rob Brinks in his multifarious duties. Steve has undertaken leadership of foreign trips including to the Dominican Republic and Peru. A significant part of his brief is to supervise TASC, and he is mobilizing to lead the TASC program in 2025.

By God's grace in 2024 RMS experienced an increase in our number of member churches to 76! Our member churches are the structural foundation of the ministry. We rely on them for both prayer and financial support. We desire to take the opportunity early in this report to express our profound gratitude to our Lord and to our member churches for their faithful, sacrificial and continuing support of our ministry.

Teens Actively Serving Christ (TASC) is an integral element of the RMS ministry. Annually, we organize week-long work programs for youth - 14-19 year olds for the five summers following their first year of high school - at member churches. In 2024 six TASCs were completed at: Grace URC - Alto, Michigan; Trinity URC - Visalia, California; Hudson Valley URC - New Hampton, New York; Redeemer OPC - Ada, Michigan; Covenant Reformed - Pella, Iowa; Oak Glen URC - Ejido-Uruapan, Baja California del Norte, México.

In 2025 we anticipate TASCs at the following locations: Ejido-Uruapan, Baja California del Norte, México (June 14-21); Cornerstone URC - Hudsonville, Michigan (June 21-28); Cornerstone URC - Sanborn, Iowa (June 21-28); Covenant URC - Pantego, North Carolina (June 21-28); Burlington URC - Burlington, Washington (July 12-19); Pompton Plains Reformed Bible Church - Pompton Plains, New Jersey (August 2-9); Trinity URC - Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada (July 26-August 2). Adding our first Canadian site to the 2025 TASC lineup is particularly gratifying, as for the first time, we will have 7 sites in 3 countries!

Another element of our ministry is disaster relief. In 2024 we were very active in Northwest Iowa in response to serious flooding that occurred there. We had close involvement with the Rock Valley United Reformed Church whose church building was severely damaged including their basement. We are pleased to report that the restoration of the Rock Valley Church is nearly complete as of this writing.

Moving into 2025, RMS stands ready to assist with continuing hurricane recovery efforts in Western North Carolina. We will deploy our resources there as necessary and as desired.

As is always the challenge with disaster relief, we never know what natural disasters will occur in any year. RMS prays that in 2025 (as well as in any coming year) that they will be minimal. Nevertheless, come what may, we are ready with resources, our shower and tool trailers and volunteer teams to respond where and whenever needed.

Both domestically and internationally, RMS conducted ministry development in 2024. Ministry development consists of dispatching teams of workers and materials to churches in need of infrastructure support. We supported Ascension Reformed Church (formerly Westside Reformed) in Cincinnati, OH with extensive repairs and remodeling to their church building.

On the foreign field, we went with teams twice to Peru, and to the Dominican Republic, Costa Rica and Campeche, México on construction and improvement projects. Funds were raised for completion of a multi-year seminary construction project in Bhaktapur, Nepal. Assistance was provided to schools in such far-flung locations as Colombia, Africa and the Philippines. We have a potential opening for ministry in Japan and our Administrative Director Rob Brinks and Board Director Mike Kamps made an exploratory trip there.

The last element of RMS's activity is SEED. SEED stands for Serve-Engage-Evangelize-Disciple. The program consists of training events in missional topics, including apologetics and practical missions training. Read about our 2025 event on the following pages and stay tuned for more SEED events!

We have mentioned our gratitude and dependence upon our member churches. That profound gratitude also extends in full measure to our individual and corporate donors. RMS depends entirely upon its donors for all operating costs and expenses. Our donor base is growing yearly. Words are a poor medium for the expression of our appreciation to the Lord of the Universe, and to all of you for your ongoing generosity which is what allows us to continue our work. Thank you from the bottom of all our hearts here at RMS!

Twelve of us participated in the RMS trip called SEED, which stands for Serve, Engage, Evangelize, Disciple. Monday all the participants, ages ranging from 15-65, from across the Midwest and Canada, traveled to Daytona Beach. Tuesday through Thursday we attended evangelism classes taught by Dr. Eric Watkins and were graciously hosted at their home. I loved every second of the classes and learned a lot. The weather was gorgeous throughout the trip, much better than the Midwest temperatures! We even got to have Tuesday's class on Evangelism and the Heart of God outside! As someone who grew up in a Reformed church, Wednesday's class was probably my favorite. It was titled "Evangelism and the Reformed Tradition", addressing many misconceptions about the evangelistic practices in Reformed churches. Thursday's class, "Evangelistic Paradigms and Practices" gave practical tips for evangelism that we could use on the trip and bring back to our home churches.

Our afternoons consisted of service projects in the area. We served Habitat for Humanity by painting a halfway house, assembling furniture and organizing at Restore, and laying tile and grout in a newly built home for Habitat. Members of the group also went to the home's of locals to assist with yard work there. On Wednesday, I along with four others, went to the new Habitat for Humanity home. Despite it being our first time laying tile, we did well and enjoyed it.

We were staying in condos right off the beach in Daytona Beach, so after our service projects we would head out to the beach. Armed with tracts written by Dr. Watkins and business cards for his church plant, Salt and Light Church, we split up into groups of 2 or 3 and walked along the beach or boardwalk and evangelized. The week we were in Daytona Beach was their annual Bike Week and so there were thousands of motorcyclists in the area. And that, along with many people on spring break, gave us great opportunities to evangelize. As an introvert who had never really done something like this, I was a little nervous to approach strangers and share the Gospel with them, but as a result I grew so much. Evangelism isn't something strictly for extroverts. The SEED team had some great conversations with people who were receptive to the Gospel. Not every person was receptive, but we trust the Holy Spirit will use that encounter to plant seeds in their life.

For our "day away" we went to St. Augustine, Florida. It's the oldest city in the nation and it was very cool to see the historical buildings and Spanish architecture. Another fun experience was surfing on Saturday morning. The coaches said the waves were perfect for beginners like us and I had a blast!

It was my first time participating in an RMS trip and I had an incredible experience. I hope to attend many more RMS trips in the future. I grew in my faith and evangelism skills and really enjoyed the trip. If you have the opportunity to go on a SEED trip, I highly suggest you take it!

BRIANNA IS A HOMESCHOOLED FRESHMAN IN HIGH SCHOOL, AND LOVES ALL THINGS MUSICAL AND WORDY. SHE IS FROM A BIG FAMILY AND RESIDES SOMEWHERE OUT IN THE MIDDLE OF NOWHERE, AROUND THE REGION OF PELLA IOWA.

"You said you used to go to a church, so do you know what the gospel is, or have you ever heard of it?" I asked.

"No, I can't say that I have."

This is just a glimpse of one conversation I had with a woman on the boardwalk of Daytona Beach. Most of the people I encountered had stories similar to hers. Some people claimed to be Christians, but lived their lives like pagans. Others had heard of Christianity, but wanted nothing to do with it, or completely misunderstood it. And then there were those, although they were few and far between, who knew nothing about it.

They had never heard of the one whom we know as Savior. They knew not of true forgiveness, compassion, and love. Freedom was foreign. They were trapped by their sin, and although they knew deep down that they were broken, they had no idea how to become whole. Most attempted to fill this void with temporary fixes and drown their sorrows in things like alcohol, drugs, and other worldly pleasures. These were the people whom my heart broke for the most. It still breaks for them.

Now to some people, it might seem like I'm exaggerating, or being overly dramatic, and maybe I am. But to a girl who's grown up in a conservative Christian community, and lived her whole life in a small-ish town, seeing a grown man wander around with his arms in his shirt like a small child, visibly sweating and muttering to himself, is jarring. And this person was not alone. There were tons of people just like him. These people are lost. They are slaves to their sin and dead in their trespasses. They NEED Jesus. They need him just as much as you and me. All of them. Who are we to deny them the truth?

During our week in Daytona Beach, our goal was simple. SEED. Serve, Engage, Evangelize, and Disciple. And that's exactly what we did. Every day, from Tuesday to Thursday, we would wake up, go to our class on Evangelism, eat lunch, and then go serve in the community. Then, after that, we would all load up, and head back to the condo for our Evangelism Practicum. Although we didn't have time to properly engage in discipleship, we were able to see the fruits of it through the labors of Pastor Eric Watkins.

Before I came to Daytona, I didn't fully grasp the importance of each of these steps. In my mind, the service part was a little unnecessary. I know, it sounds really selfish, and lazy. But it wasn't because I didn't want to get my hands dirty, or work hard, I did. I love painting, and I love working hard. There really isn't anything quite like going to bed exhausted, sore from yesterday's work, and aching from today's. It also helps that by the time your body fully sinks into the mattress you're out like a light. However, I didn't really understand why we were cleaning and organizing furniture when we could be on the Boardwalk telling people about Jesus. Now I think very differently.

After spending three days serving in a community that I was otherwise unfamiliar with, I felt a strange connection to it, and the people I served with. I hadn't realized the opportunity I was missing in my own community until serving in Daytona. You see, when you're voluntarily working hard with people, you begin to respect them, and they you. I found myself wanting to know more about the people I was with, and conversations flowed smoothly. I was even able to talk with some people about Christ and what he has done for us on the cross. As Christians, being willing to serve non-Christians shows people that we truly believe what we say we believe. We actually believe that we are to take up our cross and follow Christ. (Mathew 16:24) We truly believe that we are called to serve others in humility and value them above ourselves. (Philippians 2:3-4, Galatians 5:13, Mark 10:45)

I learned that evangelism doesn't have to be planned. You don't have to have this great speech memorized, scripted out so that in this perfect scenario, you will be able to cover every key doctrine and principle of Christianity. Because in reality, the other person isn't going to follow the script. Evangelism isn't about proving that you're right; it's about showing how wrong you once were without Christ. It's not about us. It's about him. Knowing that made evangelism so much easier. I found it wasn't all that difficult to talk to people about Jesus, after all, there was nothing they could do to me. I have already been brought from death to life, I am a new creation.

I wish I had the time and paper to explain everything that I learned, but if I did that, we'd be here forever, and my hands would cramp up from typing, and you'd probably get bored and stop reading. So let me just end with this: Evangelism isn't that hard, it's just like any other conversation, and it's far more important. It's not something we need to fear. I found that the hardest part was just choosing to walk up to someone, and start the conversation. After that, everything just sort of happened.

I loved this trip, and enjoyed every second of it. It was wonderful to get to have communion with my fellow saints and learn about Christ together. I would do it again in half a heartbeat! If you ever get the opportunity, take it. It's a great way to get out of your comfort zone and start evangelizing, and to grow in your relationship with Christ.

# Bat Cave, North Carolina

Four strangers—one from Iowa, one from Michigan, and two from Wisconsin—met in Bat Cave, North Carolina, at the end of March. None of them knew much about each other at first. But as they sat around the lunch table on that first day, the stories began to flow.

One of the guys started talking about a motorcycle trip he took in high school to the Black Hills of South Dakota. He was only 14 at the time. Another team member, Jim, chimed in: "Wait—I've heard that story before!" It turns out, Jim was friends with the same group of guys who went on that very trip. What are the chances? On RMS trips, you never know what old friendships will be uncovered or what new ones God will begin.

This group had come together to help with recovery efforts after Hurricane Helene, which struck in September 2024. Even six months later, the cleanup in the area is slow due to widespread road damage. But that didn't stop this team from getting to work. Their first project was a home that had lost much of its hill due to heavy rainfall. The storm had washed away the retaining wall, the deck, and part of the front porch. The team rebuilt the retaining wall, repaired the porch, fixed the well, seeded the lawn, and added rock to the driveway.

While working on the well, the crew's electrical skills came in handy—and opened the door to another project. A nearby house had been gutted and was waiting for a new start. The team purchased all the electrical supplies, rough-wired the home, and even provided light fixtures so the next crew could continue the work. They also cleared several trees that had been blocking roads for over six months.

One of the most memorable moments came at the blue house. The night before the team arrived, the homeowner prayed, asking God to help with the overwhelming amount of work that still needed to be done. The next morning, she woke up to the sound of power tools and voices outside her window. She was overwhelmed—not by the storm this time, but by how God had answered her prayer.

We're thankful for the prayers and support that made this trip possible and allowed us to be a blessing to many in this community. The work in the region is far from done, and many more hands are needed.

### Africa & Philippines - Student Aid

- Cost: \$7,000
- RMS is helping seminary students gain access to LOGOS Bible software and internet service for their training with Heidelberg Theological Seminary.

# El Salvador - Seminary Construction

- Cost: \$20,000
- This first phase includes the construction of a perimeter fence and foundations for a future seminary and Bible college to train pastors and laypeople.

### Mexico - Church & Parsonage Upgrades

- Cost: \$30,000
- In Villahermosa, RMS is assisting with parsonage upgrades and improvements to church facilities.
- RMS traveled here in April, more updates in the next WITNESS!

## Nepal - Aashish Church & Clinic

- Cost: \$60,000
- On his last visit to Nepal, Rob Brinks visited churches in the Himalayan foothills. RMS is partnering to build a new church and clinic. People from 12 villages walk for hours to attend worship services and Bible studies at this growing church. The project includes a clinic (two rooms attached to the church) which will bring essential health care to this remote region. Currently the nearest hospital is a five and a half hour walk.

### Darjeeling Hills Bible College

- Cost: \$80,000
- Phase 3 is starting which includes a ground floor and 2<sup>nd</sup> floor for the Mount Zion School building. This building project will move them in the direction for accreditation.

# Peru - Various Church Projects

- Cost: \$15,000 El Carmen The first floor of a new church building, with a team assisting in Nov./Dec. 2025.
- Cost: \$10,000 Alto Qosqo Funds needed to complete the construction of a new church sanctuary.
- Cost: \$6,000 Picchu A new metal roof is needed for the existing church structure.
- Cost: \$1,000 Challwacocha & Huacahuasi - Cementing the church walls to protect against rain damage.

# Costa Rica - Roof over Playground

- Cost: \$6,000
- RMS had a team put a roof over the playground at the local Christian School.

# Costa Rica - Los Cuadros Church

- Cost: \$13,500
- Land has been purchased and site work is underway. Phase 2 involves critical steps like soil testing and permitting before full construction begins.
- Next phase will be church construction.

# Liberia - New Church Building

- Cost: \$8,000
- In partnership with the PresRC (NAPARC) mission work in Liberia, RMS is supporting the construction of a new church building for the local congregation.

### Dominican Republic - Church Roofs

- Cost: \$45,000 (\$15,000 each)
- Three churches in the Monte Plata region need their wooden roofs replaced with concrete. RMS is planning to send volunteers to assist with the work in 2026.

### Cincinnati, OH - Ascension Reformed

- Cost: \$120,000
- Unexpected sewer and structural issues require funding before the church can continue with its next renovation phase.
- Volunteers also needed!

# Carbondale, PA - Covenant Reformed

- Cost: \$45,000
- A recently purchased building will be used for Sunday School, Bible Study, and community outreach. Renovations are needed inside and out.
- Volunteers also needed!

# West Michigan - Ministry Center

- Cost: \$600,000 or less
- RMS is leading efforts to construct a shared ministry center for Reformed Fellowship, RYS, and IRBC.
- Land options may lower costs significantly.



### Dear Friend of the Bible,

Across the world, from the mountains of Ethiopia to villages in India, people are hearing God's Word for the very first time—and their lives are being transformed.

**Abebech**, a young woman in Ethiopia, used her Talking Bible to bring peace into a home marked by conflict. Her once-hostile father now encourages her to go to church. Her brother—once far from faith—gave his life to Christ after just a month of listening to Scripture.

# PEACE IN HER HOME, TRANSFORMATION IN HER VILLAGE

"I use it mostly for my father because he always fights with us, his children. So, I pray for him, and he becomes calm," she shares.



# **MOSI'S STORY:**

# A LISTENING GROUP GROWS THROUGH GOD'S WORD

**"God has power—big power,"** says Mosi, a farmer and animal keeper who leads a small church group in rural Tanzania.

For years, Mosi struggled to engage the few members of his group. They met faithfully twice a week to read Scripture and pray, but without many readers and without strong participation, **growth felt impossible**.

Then, thanks to donor support, **Talking Bibles** became available in his region. Mosi was given one to use in his group—and **everything changed**.

What began as a struggling gathering quickly grew into a **vibrant Listening Group**. Today, nearly **30 people come regularly to hear God's Word**—many of whom were not members of the church before.

When not using the Talking Bible in meetings, Mosi keeps it at home so his wife can listen. Only after hearing Scripture for herself did she begin to attend the Listening Group and grow in faith alongside him.

Throughout the week, people are drawn to Mosi's home—neighbors, friends, and fellow villagers—eager to hear the Talking Bible for themselves. These unplanned visits have become powerful moments for Mosi to share God's love, encourage returning to church, and welcome new seekers into the faith community.

Mosi sees clearly how much the audio Bible is changing lives. "When they hear the Talking Bible," he says, "they understand and pay attention in a way they couldn't before."

For those who can't read, the Talking Bible is a powerful way to hear God's truth—and because of it, a once-small rural group has grown into a **thriving community of faith.**

# STEPHEN'S STORY: REJECTED BY FAMILY, EQUIPPED BY GOD

**Stephen never imagined** how much his life would change when a group of women in his village began sharing the message of Jesus with him.

# Rejected by Family

Yet he faced one major challenge: access to God's Word.


Stephen had no Bible of his own, and most of the people he discipled couldn't read. Whenever they gathered, they depended on others to read aloud—but that wasn't always possible.

# **Equipped by God**

A kind family welcomed Stephen into their home and opened their space for weekly prayer and worship. Around the same time, Stephen received a **Talking Bible—a gift** that would transform his ministry.

He began listening to Scripture as he prepared his messages. But he didn't stop there. Each week, he passes the Talking Bible to someone in the prayer group who cannot read, giving them specific passages to listen to throughout the week. When they gather on Sundays, they share what they heard—and how it changed them.

Stephen's story is a powerful reminder. When people have access to God's Word, especially in audio, everything can change.





# A Word from the President

I thank the Lord for growing up in a family where there were ten of us — eight children and two parents. And often we'd have more then ten around the kitchen table as family from the Netherlands or business people from my father's vast connections throughout the world would stay with us. And this family became a microcosm of the church. Two older siblings (both took organ lessons) where one is a current elder in a Ref'd Church, the other a foster parent for First Nations children. Younger siblings include a business woman who has financially supported the work of many churches, a brother who provides and oversees housing for single mothers, another brother who is a pastor and counselor, a sister who plays piano for assisted-living facility services, and another sister (married to a pastor), who invests in the lives of many church children in so many ways. Alongside the support from parents (for instance, my folks helped us financially with seminary) — we certainly attempted to live into Col. 3:17.

From our beginnings there at Maranatha Ref'd Church – the church, and my family – helped instill in me the "priesthood of all believers." We as a family, and as a local church – were a unit. We were not "lone-ranger" Christians but were in this "living out our faith" together. From building cabins at a church camp to giving monies to see that people in Belize and Japan got to hear the Good News of Jesus – we did this together. We each had our own Bibles – and had devotions around the kitchen table at breakfast and supper. We had the Word expounded to us off the pulpit, and explored the Word further in catechism and youth group gatherings. We could approach God in praise and petition because of what Christ had done for us all – collectively, and individually.

I love the words "network" and "alliance". It speaks of connectedness, of partnership. I love the Scriptures that speak of worship (Rom. 12:1-2), of spiritual giftedness (I Peter 4:10), and of my job description (Eph. 4:II-I2). All within each local church are priests (I Peter 2:9-10) including the Sunday School teacher, the deacon, the nursery worker, the usher and the elder. May it be that the Midwest Network churches collectively, recognize the privilege that is ours to encourage and strengthen each other, as well as to train and empower one another on in the faith. All who confess that Jesus is Lord — belong, body and soul, in life and in death to our faithful Savior Jesus Christ. Let it be that we ask the Spirit, and seek out within our fellowships, the impetus, further training, and learning to be whole-heartedly willing and ready ... to live for Him (HC, Q&A #1).

I'm thankful for you all. I'm grateful for the privilege of having been president for these past two years. I'm thankful for Dennis Olsen (past-president) and his emphasis on the priesthood of all believers. I'm excited for Cody Moret's taking the torch now, and of leading us, alongside our great staff and Admin Team, into tomorrow if the Lord tarries. And I'm thankful that this Midwest Network – local fellowships made up of priests of God – will keep advancing God's kingdom!
